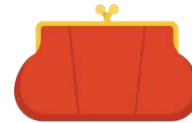

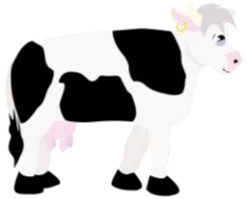

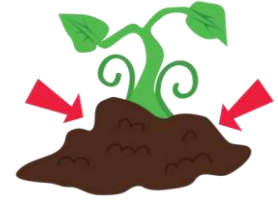

# Literacy – Writing

Ask your child:

feel happy?

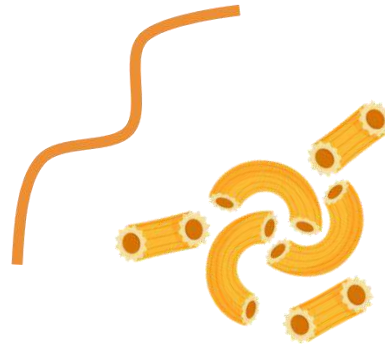


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Discuss with your child what makes them feel happy. Encourage your child to draw or write about what makes them happy. You could draw or write about what makes you feel happy too!



How many  
objects can you  
thread?



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Set up a threading challenge. You could use string, dry spaghetti or a shoelace and ask your child to thread on a set amount of cereal, dry pasta, buttons or similar. This will develop counting and fine motor skills.



Paint a picture  
of someone in  
your house.



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Ask your child to paint a portrait of someone in your house. Can you guess who it is without them telling you? If you do not have paint, you could ask them to draw a picture instead.





Estimate how many? Were you right?



Fill a bag with up to 20 objects. Ask your child to feel and estimate how many objects are there. Encourage them to make a sensible guess. Ask your child to see how close they were by counting them after!



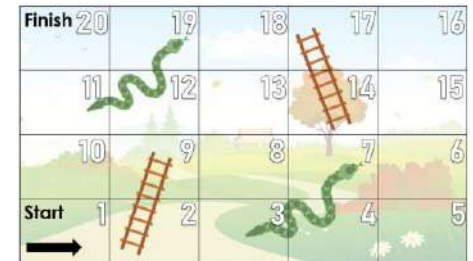
Can you find any of these in your house?



Ask your child if they can find any of these objects. They all link to the oi, or, er and ur sounds. Can they find anything else linked to those sounds? You could ask your child to write what they have found.



Explore numbers with a board game.

## Activity Outcomes

- In this activity, your child will practise number recognition, recognising how to represent numbers in different ways, partitioning and simple addition skills.
- They will also develop co-operation skills, such as turn taking.

## Setting up

### What you will need

- A board game (any game that requires counting)
- Counters
- Dice

## Activity Guide

- Set up the board game with counters and a dice.
- Either with a sibling, or an adult, children to take turns to roll the dice and move the counter to the correct space in the game.
- Ask your child to recognise the number they have rolled on the dice and the number they have moved their counter to.
- As the game progresses, help children to recognise simple addition by exploring a number being added every time the dice is rolled.

## Questions you could ask your child during the activity

- What number can you see?
- If you started on 3, and rolled a 3 on your dice, what number will you land on?
- What number is bigger/smaller?
- What number comes before/after?
